welcomed back three of our club's GRSP alumni via Zoom: Zsanett Havasi from Hungary (2007-2008), Catriona Patterson from Scotland (2009-2010), and Anna Skoglund from Sweden (2011-2012). Each shared an update about their lives after their time as GRSP students at Columbus State University.

After her GRSP year Zsanett did a 6-month internship in Barcelona, Spain and later spent a year studying Chinese in Beijing. Since her return to Hungary five years ago she has been working at the airport in Budapest in various roles. She has earned a master's degree in tourism. She said that participating in GRSP, being part of the RC of Columbus, and experiencing American life and culture more generally, had enhanced her career in tourism.

Catriona still has her RC of Columbus button and her CSU sweatshirt, which she wore while she shared with us. She completed her degree in sustainable development at the University of St. Andrews (William and Kate are not the only great alumni of this school!) and now works for a nonprofit, Creative Carbon Scotland. Roswell Partners to Build Wells in Panama



While investment has been made by the government to construct potable water systems in the indigenous communities of Panamá Este and Darién over the last 30 years, most communities persist without functional systems to provide the quantity and quality of water required for their basic needs. The result is a tremendous burden on the economy, health, and development potential.

The **Rotary Club of Roswell** is partnering with the Panama Nordeste Rotary Club, and the **Alpharetta**, **Milton and Griffin Rotary Clubs** on a TRF Global Grant to help fix that, The club joined indigenous community leadership to construct water and sanitation infrastructure in two communities for an approximated cost of \$64,162 - achieving cost-effective, sustainable WASH development in the region.

Construction started in March and today, the first well is in place in the community of Nueva Esperanza. an indigenous Embera community of 300 people located on the Tupiza River. The community has never had a water project done in their community. They currently obtain water by walking to and from the nearby river to fill up buckets or other containers with river water.

Our second project is in Nazareth, also a community of 262 that has never had a water project. They currently obtain water by walking to and from the nearby river to fill up buckets or other containers with river water.

We anticipate construction to be completed in both areas by early 2022.

A total of 26 teachers received the honor in Georgia Rotary District 6900. They received an honorarium of \$100 for their efforts. More than 25,000 high school students across Georgia shared their personal values in their Law of Life essay for this year's contest. Seven statewide winners were announced in April.

Special recognition goes to the teachers whose students won statewide honors. Heidi Chambers from Bainbridge High School whose student, Corbin Austin, was named the State Winner in the contest. Pamela White of Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts was also recognized as teacher of Jamea Harris, the winner of the George A. Stewart Jr. Character In Action Award.

Rotary clubs across Georgia conduct the Laws of Life Essay Contest in partnership with local high schools through the nonprofit Georgia Rotary Districts Character Education Program, Inc (GRDCEP). Rotarians volunteer to read and judge essays, serve on the contest's Board of Directors, and volunteer their professional expertise to help build positive character traits and strong social and emotional competency among students. The essay contest aligns with Rotary's emphasis on education, high ethical standards and service above self.

Educators from partnering high schools value the experience for their students. "Due to remote learning, this year was more difficult than normal to get to know each of our students. Having them write a personal narrative helped a little to bridge that gap." expressed Kensey D'Souza of Thomas County Central High School.

For the 2020-21 contest, a total of 25,112 students wrote essays, and 54 participating Rotary clubs in Georgia will award over \$17,000 in cash prizes. Throughout the spring, winning students will share their essays with enthusiastic audiences at local and district-wide Rotary Club meetings and at regional Rotary conferences. Videos of students reading their essays can also be found on GLL social media channels. Since 1999, the Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest has impacted over 750,000 students. Inspired by the power of simple, memorable quotes, or Laws of Life, Sir John Templeton established the writing competition in 1987 to encourage young people to embrace the wisdom of these sayings and live their best lives. In their essays, students use a law to reflect on values that mean the most to them – values such as generosity, courage, perseverance, honesty, integrity, and compassion.

May 20 offers a great example of Rotarians from multiple clubs working together to "make good things happen in our communities." Many thanks to all the volunteers from the **Rotary Clubs of Sandy Springs, Dunwoody, Roswell and Alpharetta** for making this a successful joint service project.

We had 20 Rotarians plus six volunteers from the food pantries at the Solidarity Sandy Springs loading dock from 7 - 10:30 am. Together we loaded 1,100 20 lb.+ boxes (more than 20,000 pounds of food in total) into about ten vehicles (large and small trucks, SUVs and trailers). The unloading process happened at several places in Fulton and DeKalb Counties. Just loading up represents about 70 Rotarian volunteer hours and those probably doubled as club members put in additional hours later in the day at distribution events.

Through an initial survey of members, it was determined that, among other attributes, MARC's diversity was highly appreciated. Shortly after the survey, George Floyd was killed, and our

leadership asked the Self-Reflection Team to take DEI into consideration and recommend a course of action for MARC. This work was documented in the MARC Response on Bias and Racial Injustice, which included the establishment of a new MARC Board seat for Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DE&I). The recommendation was adopted, and the MARC DE&I Team was born. President Rocky Ford and the Board created two new Board positions to ensure a permanent focus on DE&I.

Led by new Board members William Parker and Renee Weese, our DE&I Team has met almost weekly to discern and effect what DE&I can mean to Rotary, to our Club and most importantly to our members and the Community we serve. We have begun implementing our strategic plan for DE&I to provide opportunities for exploration, both as individual members and as a Club. Members Peter Chatel and Sophie Mason have stepped up to lead meaningful book discussions which have provided enlightened perspectives for many. Other central tenets of our work have included following the Rotary 4-Way Test and the DE&I mission of Rotary International, as presented on rotary.org.

It's a huge task which feels overwhelming at times. But from sharing our stories with each other, the one thing we landed on quickly is that in order to effect positive, lasting change, we must get to know one another's stories...our truths. From that realization came our monthly speaker series, "The Truth Be Told". On May 26th we hosted a virtual diversity workshop *The Truth Be Told: Through Others' Eyes.* Our consultant, Tim White, was the facilitator.

MARC's goal is to create a culture within our Club that seeks to understand the diversities in our community, cultivates relationships and provides an inviting experience, so that our Club membership becomes a reflection of the diverse community we serve. To that end, we hope to leverage our ideals as Rotarians, along with the ideas, skills and passions of our members to befriend, recruit and engage our Community to create lasting change for DE&I.

In the words of Bryan Stevenson, founder of the Equal Justice Initiative, author of Just Mercy, and subject of the Emmy winning HBO documentary, True Justice: *"We cannot create justice without getting close to places where injustices prevail. We have to get proximate... It's important to understand the ugly details so we can one day claim something really beautiful."*
