DGE André Marria Honored as a Rotary Person of Action: Champion of Inclusion



Our District Governor Elect, André Marria of Thomasville, is one of six Rotary members from around the world to be honored as a Rotary People of Action: Champion of Inclusion for her work to build a culture of inclusion as an advocate and mentor for women and people of color in southern Georgia, U.S.

Rotary members throughout the world are taking action to strengthen and empower historically marginalized and underrepresented communities by improving access to health services, education, economic opportunities, and civic participation.

Since 2005, Marria has worked to bridge cultural divides in her community by bringing those from different backgrounds together to learn about and work together as well as to improve the lives of those in need, including by supporting aspiring entrepreneurs from underserved communities. Through Marria's leadership, the Rotary Club of Thomasville has worked with a local business incubator to equip these entrepreneurs—particularly women and minorities--with the educational materials, mentors and expertise they need to succeed.

- Teaching visually impaired and homeless children from refugee settlements to express themselves through music in Turkey
- Educating and nurturing children with intellectual disabilities in Uganda
- Empowering transgender communities in India through providing access to healthcare, employment, and advocacy
- Facilitating open discussions on the social barriers people can face in the LGBTQ, disabled and other underrepresented communities in Brazil
- Supporting and cultivating relationships with Indigenous communities in Canada

"The actions taken by these Rotary members exemplify our approach to bringing people together to cultivate a more just, open and inclusive world," said Rotary International President Jennifer Jones. "We are an organization that finds common ground in our humanity and in our desire to create lasting change in our communities, the world and in ourselves. Every day, we leverage our members' diverse perspectives to fight inequalities, foster peace, and address humanitarian challenges across the globe."

Upcoming Deadline for Closeout of 2022-2023 District (Community) Grants

If you haven't completed your District (Community) Grant-funded service project, now is the time to gather and upload your spending documentation for review. **Per District 6900 guidelines**, **spending documentation must be uploaded to rotary6900.org within 30 days of spending all funds or by March 31, 2023, whichever is earlier.**

If you have a grant that is currently in overdue status, documentation is to be uploaded immediately and submitted for review. Thank you to those clubs that have already uploaded their spending documentation.

Once again, this has been a very interesting year to say the least. Covid-19 has continued to impact our work as Rotarians. Yet we continue to forge ahead and work diligently with our partnering organizations to complete the spending of all grant funds. Well done! Should your club have any issues with completing the spending of your grant funds, please contact me immediately to discuss options.

I have adjusted the schedule slightly from what was published at the beginning of the year. The revised schedule:

- For project end dates of February 28 to March 31, all receipts etc. submitted via website by March 31st for review.
- All grants (regardless of project end date) must be closed by April 7.

Not adhering to the schedule listed above could affect your club's eligibility to apply for a grant for

2023-2024.

Our Rotary Foundation at Work

TRF Establishes Two Temporary Relief Funds for Pakistan and Ukraine

As a global humanitarian organization, Rotary continually takes action to help communities in need. In that spirit, The Rotary Foundation has established two temporary funds to support immediate relief efforts in Pakistan and Ukraine. In Pakistan, a severe monsoon season has caused devastating floods and affected millions of people. In Ukraine, the ongoing war has led to a continued humanitarian crisis.

The Pakistan Flood Response Fund will help communities recover from the disaster that displaced people and destroyed crops. It will accept contributions, including District Designated Funds, until 31 December 2023 and distribute grants until 30 June 2024 or until the funds are spent. Any unused money will be transferred to the general Disaster Response Fund.

The Ukraine Response Fund will also accept contributions, including District Designated Funds, to support grants for districts affected by the war. It will operate on the same schedule as the Pakistan fund, accepting donations until 31 December 2023 and awarding grants until 30 June 2024 or until the money is spent. Any unused funds will also be transferred to the Disaster Response Fund.

Georgia Rotary Student Program commemorates the Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month through education and public awareness as our one-of-a-kind program has been bringing nations together since 1946. GRSP's purpose for the last 77 years has been to develop potential global leaders who promote understanding and peace around the world.

We believe that peace is possible as we extend one-year ambassadorial scholarships to international college students who spend one year in Georgia colleges and universities learning about the American way of life, receive mentorship from sponsoring Rotary Clubs and build lasting relationships with Rotarians as well as classmates from various countries.

Just ask one of our 3,731 alumni from more than 109 countries around the world. That's exactly what our one-of-a-kind Rotary program has done. And by the way, did you know that one of our alumni is now a GRSP Trustee in District 6910, and one of last year's alumni, Wade Gunning, has just become a Rotarian in the **Atlanta Metro Rotary Club**?

Emilio Ochoa Botero of Colombia, an engineering student, will finish his major when he returns to Colombia this summer. He decided to take classes he would have never have had the chance to take at his home university. "As an engineering student, I've taken Italian and

Cultural Anthropology, and now taking Korean, Japanese, English Composition and Understanding Peace and Conflict," Botero said.

GRSP has provided the opportunity for Botero to interact with people from different countries such as the United States, Korea, Germany, UK, Argentina, Pakistan, Spain, countries from Scandinavia and Africa. The experience has allowed him to learn about know new cultures and ways of life.

The singing of the Peace Song at our annual Conclave is an honored GRSP tradition. Alumni from all over the world have learned the words - and Rotarians too - and stand together in peace and harmony thanks to this special song. The beautiful lyrics were written by our Administrator Emeritus Janis Comer and the music was written by Bernard Wong, GRSP Class of 1994-95. The second verse of the song includes the lyrics, "Peace, oh what a perfect way in which to live our lives each day, in thought and deed, in work and play. Peace, oh what a perfect way!"

The Rotary Club of Dunwoody will host the GRSP Leadership Conference February 10 to 12 in partnership with Rotarians from Buckhead, Brookhaven, North Atlanta and Gainesville. - Possesses strong leadership and organizational skills
- Brings energy, new ideas, and committed to using grants for the benefit of the clubs and The Rotary Foundation
- Able to avoid any actual or perceived conflict of interest with a beneficiary organization

North Atlanta Goes Global



Some 300,000 children / year worldwide die or are maimed because of a lack of a simple and cheap vitamin (vitamin B9 or folic acid) in their mothers' diets, which can cause fatal or devastating birth defects such as spina bifida. An estimated 75% of these tragedies could be prevented simply by

ensuring that women of childbearing age get the vitamin through food fortification or supplements. Thus, approx. 225,000 babies can be saved each year if this initiative is fully adopted.

The **Rotary Club of North Atlanta** is working to make a difference, on both the club and International levels. On the club level, the club is partnering with a club in Addis Ababa through a five-year global grant project to provide folic acid to women at high risk. Rotary clubs from other districts are participating partners.

On the international level, the club is a signatory of a letter and resolution to the World Health Assembly (the governing body of W.H.O.) to recommend that countries adopt policies for mandatory fortification of food with folic acid and other essential micronutrients. Joining the club are more than thirty other organizations including UNICEF, the March of Dimes, and the International Rescue Committee. Our unique club logo is included in the letter.

This easily scalable project will save lives, prevent suffering, and promote awareness of this inexpensive opportunity to make a significant impact on child morbidity and mortality around the world.
