







































































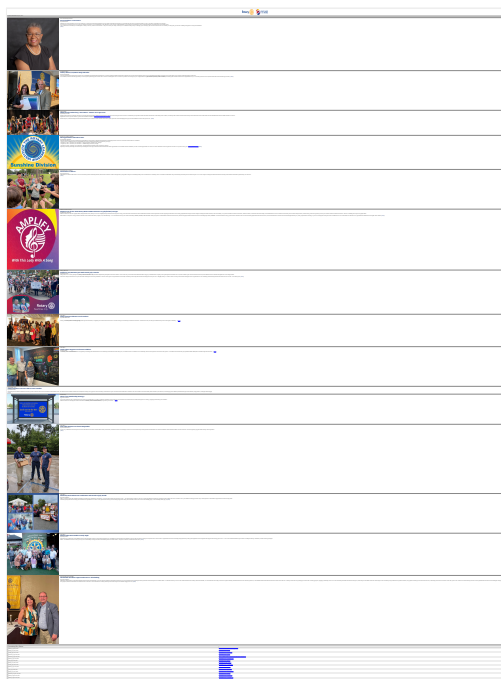

GRSP Update

GRSP Conclave Slated Aug. 18 in Macon - Reserve Your Spot Now!



Rotarians and guests are invited to Conclave to welcome the Georgia Rotary Student Program Class of 2023-24 in Macon August 18-20. Conclave is hosted this year by District 6920 and under the direction of the Rotary Club of Macon, the Rotary Club of Macon North and the Rotary Club of Downtown Macon with Rebecca Grist and GRSP 6920 Director Milton Heard as co-chairs.

Conclave is the kickoff event for GRSP and allows the international college scholarship students to interact with one another as well as GRSP leadership, GRSP Foundation board, trustees, emeritus members, host families, club presidents, alumni and Rotarians throughout the state. Students, trustees, officers and host families will participate in a general session at 12:30 p.m. Friday at First Presbyterian Church Macon. The welcome dinner for registered Rotarians and guests will be held from 6:30 to 9:30 pm at Fall Line Brewing Company Friday, featuring a taco bar for \$45 per person. Students will provide a short introduction along with naming their trustee and their sponsoring Rotary Club or Clubs.

Students and registered Rotarians will spend Saturday morning in sessions in an orientation and overview of GRSP. Students will also rehearse for Saturday's "GRSP Live," the popular variety-style performance and parade of flags, which is scheduled from 6-9 pm with a coat-and-tie dinner and program at First Presbyterian. The Southern-fare dinner will be \$55 per person. Saturday concludes at Hotel Forty Five with a student mixer in the Reckon Café and a Rotary mixer at the Hightales Rooftop Bar.

A special thanks to Macon-area Rotarians who will serve as weekend hosts to our students. **Hotel Forty Five, historic-boutique hotel in downtown Macon, has a block of rooms set aside for Conclave participants who will need lodging with July 18 as the deadline to reserve the special rate.** The hotel link is in the registration information below.

GRSP scholars are pre-registered for the event and meals. Rotarians and guests may register for Friday and/or Saturday dinners through the registration information below as well.

On Sunday morning, the students will have breakfast with their weekend host families before returning to their respective colleges and universities or their club host family.

The first GRSP class consisted of four students from Norway, France, Czechoslovakia and Greece. Since the program's inception in 1946, Georgia Rotarians have brought 3,775 students from 109 different countries and every continent except Antarctica. Ninety-seven Georgia Rotary Clubs participate in this program which is exclusive to Georgia and not replicated in Rotary. The most recent class of 2022-23 featured 44 students consisting of 27 females and 17 males from 21 countries, including our first student from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. These students study in 23 colleges and universities throughout Georgia, and as the GRSP logo states, we have literally been "bringing nations together since 1946!" Good Times at RYLA!!!

Summertime in District 6900 mean it's time for the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, better known as RYLA!! RYLA is designed for young adults with proven leadership ability and a commitment to community service. The District 6900 RYLA camp was hosted by the Rotary Club of Americus June 17-21 on the campus of Georgia Southwestern State University and included 104 students sponsored by over 40 clubs.

Through RYLA, these young people from different backgrounds - home, educational, religious, and lifestyle - are brought together to work, learn, and discuss the issues that exist within their generation. They have the chance to learn and challenge themselves through team activities, large group activities, and candid, round-table discussions. RYLA programming includes individual personality profiles, conflict resolution styles, and ropes course activities designed to encourage teamwork, communication, and trust. Included once again was the opportunity to participate in a service project which allowed the students to experience the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self" firsthand - the group painted inspirational "RYLA Rocks" to be placed around the campus.

One of the recurring themes of RYLA is the student who accomplishes a feat he/she would have never dared to imagine before coming to camp. The most memorable of these culminating events are always the board break, which allows students to break through their fears to reach their goals, and the Trust Fall from a 5-foot platform into the waiting arms of teammates. And just as always,

most of the students who were very hesitant to spend the weekend with over 100 strangers became the friends who did not want to part ways at the end. This speaks volumes to the benefit of RYLA and the positive changes it can create in young lives.

Even more telling of the long-lasting influence of RYLA is the fact that 90% of the counselors were once RYLA participants themselves – they believe in it enough to commit the time and energy to make RYLA the best experience possible. Approximately 75 Rotarians assisted with RYLA in some capacity, with most contributing on the club level with the nomination and selection of student participants while others provided transportation to and from RYLA, and the brave few who agreed to serve as chaperones in the dorms. Special guests this year were DG George Granade, DGE Andre Marria, DGN Gordon Owens, and DGND Steve Ivory who joined us for several days volunteering as Chaperones and spending time with the student teams.

RYLA aims to help students discover their potential and develop the skills needed to be leaders in their communities, careers, and everyday lives. And they achieve these goals while having fun, building friendships, and creating memories that will last a lifetime. We're already looking forward to 2024 when RYLA will be held June 8-12. We hope to see you and your students there!

degrees during the month of March, with low humidity. It's perfect weather for walks on the beach, outdoor activities, and fun for the whole family! This island features a mix of calmness and curiosity with its white sandy beaches, natural beauty, and tons of greenery. This city also houses almost 33 historic structures. There is something for everyone on Jekyll Island.

DGE André is a Lady with a Song, and this conference will be filled with music, laughter, fun, and fellowship. Let's celebrate all the ways our clubs make Rotary BIGGER, BETTER, AND LOUDER! Make your plans to attend District Conference March 21-24, 2024 at the Jekyll Island Convention Center in beautiful Jekyll Island, GEORGIA. We look forward to seeing you there! The conference will be at the beautiful Jekyll Island Convention Center, and several hotels have room blocks reserved through February 21, 2024. Jekyll Island is booming, so you are encouraged to book your hotel room NOW! Once our room blocks are sold there is no guarantee that additional room nights will be added.

A word to the wise: It's much easier to make your hotel reservation by calling the hotel! Trying to reserve online will only frustrate you! When making your reservation, please be sure and reference the group Rotary District 6900. We have room blocks reserved with The Westin Jekyll Island, which is within walking distance of the Convention Center; the Courtyard by Marriott and The Residence Inn, which have a free island-wide shuttle; Hampton Inn & Suites; Seafarer Inn & Suites; Holiday Inn Resort; and the Beachview Club Hotel. There are other hotels on the island, as well as short-term rentals and camping opportunities, but as of right now only the hotels listed here are offering reduced rates for conference attendees. We will keep you posted if other hotels are added.

To register for conference, login to rotary6900.org and click on "Register for the 2024 District Conference at Jekyll Island." The registration fee is \$275. There are also special rates for guests, students, and children under the age of 17. The registration fee will go up in September (\$295), so it pays to register early!

There is a new Cancellation Policy in place for the Registration Fee only. Hotel cancellations will be per the hotel policy. Any cancellation before November 1, 2023 will receive a full refund less \$25. Cancellations between November 1, 2023 and January 1, 2024 will receive a 75% refund. Cancellations between January 2, 2024 and March 1, 2024 will receive a 50% refund. Cancellations between March 2, 2024 and March 15, 2024 will receive a 25% refund. There will be no refunds after March 15, 2024.

Peachtree City Rotarians Join 50th Annual July 4 Parade

Along with over 115 other participants, **Rotary Club of Peachtree City** President Amy Benton participated in her first "official" event of the new year with the 50th Annual Peachtree City July 4 Parade! While a majority of the participants are decked out in red, white and blue golf carts for the three-mile route, PTC Rotarians ride in and walk alongside two of our Dragon Boats!

The club is ready to kick off our new year! DG Andre challenged each of her presidents to choose a music genre to represent their club and/or community and to help share the theme through the next year as we "Amplify Rotary". In order to share our story of the oldest and largest service organization in our community, President Amy Benton has chosen to focus on 1967 - our charter year!

The year 1967 delivered a rainbow of innovative music, movies, art and fashion, leading to the huge "Summer of Love" gathering across multiple cities. Music fueled much of the spirit of the times and brought HOPE to the youth of America. Eight years after the founding of our beautiful town of Peachtree City, leaders in the community and with support from the Rotary Club of Newnan, chartered the Rotary Club of Peachtree City on November 13, 1967. This started an era of service to those in our community and a membership like none other of like-minded citizens and business leaders. Fifty-six years later and 116 members strong, we continue to "Create Hope in the World."

With this in mind and the fact that DG Andre will be visiting our club in early July, we are kicking off

our year with the theme of “Amplifying Rotary since 1967”. President Amy has already begun the year with some kick-start ideas and opportunities. Our club has been awarded the first collaborative district grant and the largest funding ever received in our district - \$30,000 - to support a program with Midwest Food Bank in partnership / collaboration with the Rotary Clubs of Barnesville, Fayetteville, Griffin, Griffin Daybreak, Lake Spivey/Clayton County, Newnan and Tyrone! President Amy also implemented our new application process for Community Grants to help us make better decisions on local non-profit organizations to partner with throughout the year with our funding as well as hands-on projects. We have already received approvals from Booth Middle School to charter a new Interact Club this fall and will be implementing the Be THE Voice program here as well.

We are also kicking off two new fundraising efforts this year (on top of our 16th annual Dragon Boat festival) - the 1st Annual Bourbon & Bow Ties, Pinot & Pearls (cocktail event) scheduled for Thursday, November 2, 2023 on the Great Lawn at Town of Trilith (focused on fundraising specifically for the Rotary Foundation) and the 1st Annual PTC Half Marathon planned for January 13, 2024 to be held on the golf carts paths of Peachtree City.

Looking forward to next year as well, our District Conference committee has already started the planning events and are looking for a record turnout at Jekyll Island in March!
