D6900 Rotarians Make a Difference in Ukraine



I cannot express my gratitude enough for the tremendous support you and the district have provided in the efforts to assist with the crisis in Ukraine.

So far, combining all the efforts from cash fundraising, purchased equipment, and donated medical

equipment and supplies, we have delivered or are in the process of delivering about \$1 million in value of aid.

The \$29,000 that we sent to District 2241 (Romania, Moldova) was used for purchasing basic supplies and for facilitating transportation of equipment and supplies into Ukraine. So far, Rotary D2241 has organized transportation of 300+ trucks filled with donated and purchased food, water, hygiene supplies, medical supplies, and medical equipment - with an estimated value of about \$16 million.

Through the leadership, guidance and resources of AG Chris Brand, D600 has also used \$100,000 of donated funds to purchase specifically requested surgical equipment for use in orthopedics and negative pressure wound treatment systems. Chris has also arranged shipment of 250,000 MREs to Ukraine. Rotary club members have volunteered many hours at FODAC to micro sort donated items in preparation for shipment to Ukraine.

Youth and Peace in Action

YPA Continues for 2022-2023 Rotary/School Year



Our district and clubs were leaders this year investing in the YPA initiative – the largest local community-led peacebuilding initiative in RI history. While this pilot project encountered some challenges due to COVID, we had 77 students complete the My PeaceBuilder Foundations online course and become certified PeaceBuilders. Additionally, students from **Furlow Charter School** sponsored by the **Rotary Club of Americus** completed the Leading Peacebuilder Project Team training and were recognized at the YOUnited event. Their teacher, Joanna Arnold was recognized as one of two Peace Activators of the Year from across the Zones. **You can watch the video where the students talk about their project** - it's quite impressive.

For 2022-23, YPA will be separated into two distinct, affordable, sustainable initiatives:

- My Peacebuilder Foundations: Any high school can sign up for YPA for \$100, and make online content and certification available to any/all students and teachers to use and adapt as needed. This is possible because the YPA platform is in place.
- Leading Peace Project Teams: This "premier peace product" will be available to any
 participating high school through a \$500 Rotary Club sponsorship. This supports YPA peace
 project training and mentoring for an Interactors or other students. Up to 10 students can
 participate and become certified.

YPA will market to schools and help "match" interest with Rotary Clubs that weren't able to board the Peace Train in 2021-22. All are welcome to join in this year!

Because of the significant investment made by our district in the pilot project, those investing clubs and sponsored schools already have tickets for the 2022-2023 Peace Train.

Check with DG Mary to know if your club and school already have a Peace Train ticket for 2022-2023. Information on the professional development will be coming soon.

In honor of its 100th Anniversary, the **Rotary Club of Moultrie** donated over \$10,000 to local organizations to support their efforts in making our community a better place. The selected groups include The Forgotten Initiative, Serenity House, YMCA Seniors, Hero House, Leadership Legends, Breathe Ministries, and the Humane Society. We look forward to seeing these groups change lives!

After much success placing seven *Little Free Libraries* (repurposed newspaper boxes) in the Moultrie community during the 20-21 Rotary year, the club had the opportunity to partner with Colquitt County Schools to build six additional libraries this year. The libraries were built by the construction classes at C.A. Gray Junior High School and will be registered with the national organization. These new *Little Free Libraries* will be and located at C. A. Gray Junior High School as well as Cox, Stringfellow, Okapilco, Norman Park, and Funston Elementary Schools. While they are located at schools, everyone in the community is encouraged to use them to share and borrow books.

With more than 775 million people over the age of 15 (nearly 17 percent of the world's adult population) being illiterate, the club hopes this initiative will strengthen the capacity of Moultrie and Colquitt County to support basic education and literacy.

East Cobb AVID Program Jumpstarts Wheeler High Student Futures



The Advancement Via Individual Determination or (AVID) program was started at Wheeler High School in 2017 by the **Rotary Club of East Cobb** to assist students who are from groups traditionally underrepresented in higher education and/or may become the first members of their families to attend college. In addition to rigorous coursework, AVID students also receive additional academic, social, and emotional support as they prepare for college. Rotarians have donated more than \$60,000 and their time for mentoring since the program started.

The Cobb County School District announced last month that 13 Wheeler seniors in the current AVID program have been accepted to college and have received more than \$5 million in scholarship offers. The district said, "After graduating from Wheeler, the AVID students plan to major in sports medicine, political science, biology, forensic science, psychology, chemistry, international business, and more. One is set on being a pediatric surgeon, while another aims for law school."

In a recent meeting with the club, one student said, "I'm really grateful for every single person and the [Wheeler] program and teaching staff, everyone and all the people that have supported us. It's been some of the greatest years of my life."

Rotary "Service Above Self" National Medal of Honor Recipients Recognized



In Rotary's ideals of Vocational Service, our Law Enforcement, Fire Safety, First Responders, and other public safety personnel serve above self within their profession each day. They ask for a fair wage and the opportunity to serve, yet their level of service has the potential to far exceed normal expectations of "Service Above Self." Rotary International developed a method for Rotary Clubs to honor those community heroes who share its motto of "Service Above Self" within their professions and the club reached out to leaders in law enforcement and public safety for nominations.

In this second year of awarding the Rotary National Medal of Honor, the **Rotary Club of Americus** recently recognized four public service personnel for providing exemplary service to the citizens of the Americus and Sumter County community. The club honored them with a luncheon held on Tuesday, May 10 in the Marshall Private Dining Room on the campus of Georgia Southwestern State University.

Corporal Sherman Anthony of the Sumter County Sheriff's Office was awarded the Rotary "Service Above Self" National Medal of Honor for Deputy of the Year. Corporal Anthony has served as a dedicated public servant with the Sheriff's Office since July of 2011 and was nominated by Sheriff Eric Bryant. His work ethic pared with a professional and courteous attitude sets him apart and he is heralded for providing exemplary service to the citizens of Sumter County.

Theo Baldwin was recognized with the National Medal of Honor for Firefighter of the Year, nominated by Chief Jerry Harmon of the Sumter County Fire Department. Baldwin was recognized for going the extra mile in everything he does and for constantly striving to do more and learn more, making him a wealth of knowledge and an invaluable asset to the department.

The mission of the Center for Children & Young Adults (CCYA) is to provide safe and suitable housing, youth development activities and comprehensive supportive housing services for at-risk homeless youth who have been abandoned, abused, neglected and/or sexually exploited.
