Online Leads Turn Into New Members



Our Rotary Foundation at Work

RC of North Atlanta Continues to Fight Against Spina Bifida



The **Rotary Club of North Atlanta (RNCA)** begins the second year of a five-year global grant project to reduce serious birth defects in Ethiopia. Details of the project are listed on the Rotary Showcase: https://spc.rotary.org/project?guid=58368E94-0EEB-425B-A603-3B33487A45D9

Women who lack an essential, inexpensive vitamin in their diets – vitamin B-9, also known as folic acid – are at a higher risk of having a child with spina bifida, anencephaly, and other developmental issues known collectively as *neural tube defects (NTDs)*. Some of these children will not survive childbirth, and those who do face a lifetime with disabilities including paralysis and lack of bowel and bladder control, along with shorter lifespans. Many of these cases can be prevented by introducing folic acid into the diets of women of childbearing age *before* they become pregnant.

For perspective, Ethiopia's rate of NTDs is about 10X that of the United States, which has been fortifying wheat flour with folic acid since the late 1990s. Ethiopia's NTD rate is currently among the highest in the world.

Moreover, women who have already given birth to a child with an NTD face a *10X risk of having* another child with these disabilities. RNCA's project works with health professionals in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia to identify these high-risk women whose children are patients in two city hospitals, providing them will folic acid tablets for prevention and tracking subsequent birth outcomes.

RCNA partnered with other clubs in the USA; two Rotary clubs in Addis Ababa; and logistically with the ReachAnother Foundation, a non-profit with operations in Oregon and Ethiopia. During the first year of the project, some 800,000 high-dose folic acid tablets were purchased and distributed to a target cohort of 1850 mothers in the hospitals. Significantly, other hospitals in Addis Ababa heard about the project and have solicited the folic acid tablets (otherwise unavailable in Ethiopia) for their own patients – an indicator of local impact of the initiative.

This [second] year, the RNCA is increasing the target cohort to 2200 patients, ordering a million more doses, and adding two more hospitals in Addis Ababa. So far, the club has raised \$11,100 in donations for the second year of the project, with an expected 100% match from District 6900 and an 80% match from Rotary International. This year's budget for the project is \$46,846 after additional donations are received from our other Rotary partners.

The RCNA's grant proposal can serve as a template for other clubs and other regions to engage in similar projects. We also welcome additional participants in our current project. 
Grocery Shopping With Sandy Springs

DeKalb Rotary Council Collects Equipment for FODAC




The 12th Annual home medical equipment collection event for FODAC is in the books! On August 3, 2024 our community of Rotarians and Rotaractors came together on the back patio of the 57th Fighter Group Restaurant to organize into groups who were then assigned to go into the community to pick up donated home medical equipment. This equipment is then refurbished by FODAC at their Stone Mountain site, and distributed back out to those in the community in need, generally for free or at a very low cost.

Over the previous 11 years that North Atlanta Rotary Club has organized this event, we have collected equipment totaling about \$2,000,000 in value (verified by FODAC). Over the last 9 or so years North Atlanta Rotary Club has organized this project with the cooperation and participation of our fellow Dekalb Rotary Council Clubs: Atlanta Metro, Brookhaven, Decatur, Dunwoody, Emory Druid Hills, North Atlanta, South DeKalb, Stone Mountain, Tucker, and Metro Atlanta Rotary, the Atlanta Rotaract Club, the North DeKalb Lions Club, and friends and family members. This year we gathered about 70 volunteers, including District Gov Gordon Owens and his wife Ashley. We made 43 pickups from around the greater Metro Atlanta area including Chamblee, Doraville, Stone Mountain, Snellville, Sandy Springs, Smyrna, Marietta, and Roswell.

In addition to the silent auction, PDG Hagan led a live auction of a wooden gavel, made from the Rotary Oaks planted by Paul Harris and the Tuskegee Rotary Club and donated by PDG Steve Stanfield. The gavel was won by Terry Taylor with proceeds to benefit the Rotary Foundation. Emily Sheffield Hollingsworth attends the gala as a special guest. She is married to Rotarian Lee Hollingsworth of the Roswell Club but is a native of Americus and considers it her home. She gave a touching recollection of growing up in Rotary and attending numerous events with her father Langdon "Lang" Sheffield. Over 20 past Sheffield Award recipients were in attendance, along with

numerous other guests, including PDGs Cheryl Greenway, Bob Hagan, and Andre' Marria, and District Governor Nominee Cynthia Edwards.

The Sheffield Leadership Award, established in 1994, is awarded by the District Governor of 6900 and presented by the Rotary Club of Americus in honor of three Past District Governors, all from the same family and from the Americus Rotary Club. It honors John West Sheffield (District 30, 1926-27), John W. Sheffield (District 690, 1961-62), and Langdon Sheffield (District 690, 1975-76), who have each served this Rotary District as District Governors.

Blakely's 98-Year History of Making a Difference



In its 98th year, the Rotary Club of Blakely has a rich history of serving Early County. This year's President Scott Watford recognized some of that work as he took office this July. He praised outgoing leader David Atkins for starting the local military veterans outreach program which helps Early County veterans learn more about VA benefits. The Rotary Club sponsors the program in conjunction with the Blakely-Early County Chamber of Commerce. Veterans are urged to meet with outreach leaders on the first Monday of each month at the Chamber of Commerce building on Courthouse Square to discover more about the various benefits due them.

President Scott also called for the club to carry on in its work in Early County - especially those supporting literacy. And the club remembered a couple of key projects in its history:

- In 1938, the club participated in the establishment of Kolomoki State Park, a few miles north of the Blakely city limits. The edition of the Early County News that reported the park's creation was termed a "red letter day" in the history of Blakely and Early County.
- The club helped start the Public Library in Blakely. First located in the rear of Howell Drug Store, the sparkling library of today came about in the 1970s after the Rotary Club helped start the "Friends of the Library" organization. Rotarians raised the money and donated it for the Lucy Hilton Maddox Memorial Library facility. In more recent times, the club also donated the funds necessary for a local historical group to purchase the building on North Main Street that houses the Early County Museum.

Founded in 1995 by Roger Ackerman, a Rotarian in Sumter, SC, <u>The CART Fund</u> (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust) is a non-profit grassroots organization that provides "seed" money for cutting edge, high impact research grants to help find a treatment or cure for Alzheimer's Disease.

This past year, CART awarded a record \$1.4 million in grants, making the cumulative total \$13 million that has been distributed to more than 70 research institutions in the US. CART is currently supported by more than 600 Rotary Clubs in more than 40 Rotary districts. In 2023-24,

Rotary District 6900 raised \$14,335 for CART, and the top 3 clubs in total giving were:
