David has served with the Alpharetta Fire Department for more than 20 years and began noticing a pattern among some residents who had become dependent on 911 services for ongoing health and social needs. Recognizing the gap between emergency response and available community resources, he helped launch My Watch Alpharetta - **a community paramedicine program** designed to bridge the gap and connect residents with the right level of care and support.

The **mission** of My Watch Alpharetta is simple yet powerful: to sustain quality of life with dignity.



Community Paramedicine is one of the most progressive developments in modern healthcare and emergency medical services. By expanding the traditional role of EMS providers, the program improves access to **primary and preventative care**, supports **wellness initiatives** within the medical home model, reduces **emergency department overuse**, and ultimately helps save healthcare dollars while improving patient outcomes.

In addition to medical support, My Watch Alpharetta focuses on **Community Risk Reduction** - addressing injury prevention and helping residents access essential resources such as mobility aids, lift systems, grab bars and wheelchairs through partnerships with local organizations.

Prospecting for Rotary Lunch Guests

Each has developed a knack for sparking conversations, spotting good fits, and turning a casual invite into a great Rotary connection. We asked them to share some of their tips and stories.

When you're talking to someone new, how do you usually bring up Rotary without it feeling like a sales pitch?

Richard keeps it simple and heartfelt: I usually just say that "You will have a better, healthier, happier life if you get involved with Rotary. You should dig deeper into us to see what Rotary does and how we impact the world."

Cliff takes a more reflective approach: What's been your experience in doing things in the community? What are your thoughts on giving back to the community?

What kind of people do you think make the best lunch guests - and how do you spot them?

Richard suggests starting with acquaintances: Just ask acquaintances if they've ever been to a Rotary meeting. If they haven't, tell them they will be your guest to an eye-opening experience.

Cliff looks for people in transition or connection mode: People who are at other

networking events, who are "super busy" and work off a schedule, and/or are recently retired and trying to figure out what makes best sense for their new world.

Peace Pole Installation and North Park Garden Work Days

As a reminder, our club was successful in seeking a grant to enhance our Peace Garden (rebranded from Reflection Garden) with new plantings, mulch and a second peace pole. In addition, this grant includes installing a peace pole and bench at Wellstar North Fulton Hospital.

We have several Saturday dates in the coming weeks where you can get involved and lend a hand as we build and install these 2 peace poles in addition to installing a new garden entrance at North Park. Assume a 9 am or 10 am start time each day with 1-3 hours of work (depending on the day).

October 25th: Immediate Past President Rick Clark will need 1-3 volunteers to help build 2 peach poles at the home of Past District Governor Gordon Owens

November 1st: Immediate Past President Rick Clark will need 2-5 volunteers to help install 1 peach pole, some pavers and a bench, as well as a sign at Wellstar North Fulton Hospital

November 8th: Past President Steve Siders will need 5-8 volunteers to do various tasks at North Park (those who have pickaxes and shovels will be in high demand)!

November 15th: Past President Steve Siders will need 6-12 volunteers to help dig holes and install new plants at North Park (bring your shovels).

Score for Polio Plus Fundraiser

It was another exciting football weekend. More exciting for some than others but whether your team won or not, Rotary won! **President Erik** and his Oregon Ducks slipped to second place as **Past President Richard** and his double teaming with Denmark HS Flag Football and Oconee High pushed him to \$352! **Jonathon** and his Falcons are coming up fast and he is now in third place at \$275, squeaking by **Kathleen's** Fighting Irish at \$274 and moving **Past President Lisa** and her Baylor Bears to fifth place with \$254.

Your generosity in support of The Rotary Foundation Polio Plus fund has been more than hoped, with pledges totaling almost \$4,000. Our goal for the entire season was \$3500 and there is a lot of football yet to be played. Our club has typically donated between \$1,500 and \$2,000, so \$3,500 is a big increase. We have also been very generous supporters of the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund, which supports District and Global Grants. Our board has agreed that funds over \$3500 should be directed to the Annual Fund. Therefore, it was proposed that the first \$175 of your pledge be donated to Polio Plus and any amount over that be donated to the Annual Fund. **World Polio Day is this week, on October 24th** and it would be amazing of some (or all) of our Score for Polio Plus participants would make some of their donation on that day.
