The following is the Reader's Digest version of Sid Biographical information. A resident of Atlanta for 40 years, Sidney Kirschner transferred to Atlanta to join National Service Industries, Inc. (NSI) in an Executive capacity. At the time, NSI was a Fortune 500 Corporation with annual revenue of 500 million dollars. Kirschner eventually became Chairman and CEO, growing the company to a 3 billion dollar conglomerate resulting from his intricate involvement in more than thirty significant acquisitions, transactions and multimillion dollar expansion projects. Kirschner retired in 1992 to work in the non-profit world. He had served on Northside Hospital's board of directors from 1984 and became President and CEO of Northside Hospital following his retirement from NSI. Kirschner served as the President & CEO of Piedmont Heart Institute, President & CEO of Piedmont's Physicians' Organization and currently serves as Executive Vice President and Chief Philanthropy Officer of Piedmont Healthcare, Inc., a 2 Billion dollar multi hospital system in Atlanta, GA. Kirschner was born in Ottawa, Canada in 1934 and was raised in New York. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in mining engineering from the New Mexico School of Mines in 1956. After graduating, Kirschner joined Aerojet-General Corporation as an engineer. He rose through the management ranks in jobs at Aerospace Corporation, Curtiss-Wright Corporation and General Dynamics Corporation from 1960 to 1973. He left General Dynamics as president of the Electric Motor Division to join NSI.

An Amazing Gift - Two Rotary Youth Exchange Students talked about their experiences.

With professional poise and an attention-grabbing demeanor, Kate Rojasles made her presentation memorable. Kate referred to her Rotary Youth Exchange Scholarship as "An Amazing Gift". The challenges she faced over the last two years forced a lot of changing and growing. The transformation and development of social skills were two gifts that she enjoyed, but she thought perhaps the most important gift was a lesson that had to do with relationships and how to build them. She outlined 3 specific points that she strived to achieve with each host family and now with everyone she meets. Point 1: Be accepting, Point 2: Be authentic and vulnerable, Point 3: Be intentional. She built on each point giving real world examples.

In part two of the presentation Alex took over the microphone. Punctuating his presentation were two quotes that had profound meaning.

Quote one: "You always want to be where your feet are." - That's a Rotary Youth Exchange idea that is encouraged as a reminder to stay focused in the present. It also helps keep the students from reflecting too much on how much they may miss their family and friends from home.

Quote two: "Teamwork makes the dream work." - This was a Japanese saying that has been pressed into the fibers of his being. He made mention of the extreme competitiveness of the students and that it was a real culture shock. Speaking of culture shock, he spent several moments describing just how extremely crowded the streets could be in a major city of Japan.

These two exchange students are such a great example of what the Rotary Youth Exchange can do. Be assured fellow Rotarians that the money spent sponsoring these students is a wise investment.
