Clinical Research on New Tools against Cancer



Jim MacDonald

Jim graduated with a BS in Biological Sciences from Drexel University in Philadelphia. After deciding that a career in medicine was not for him, Jim worked for the next 33 years for what was to ultimately become the pharmaceutical giant SmithKline Beecham Corporation (today known as GlaxoSmithKline) based in Philadelphia and London. His career essentially followed the clinical research and development process of new drugs, starting in preclinical research investigating pathology and toxicology of early research drugs, and later with a career in the human clinical research and development process. In this capacity

he managed human clinical research studies of investigational drugs, with a primary focus in antibiotic and antineoplastic research. Jim also spent several years in regulatory affairs where he coordinated the liaison of several investigational portfolios with the FDA, including new drug applications.

These days, you are likely to find Jim and his dog Eddie hiking Kennesaw Mountain. In his spare time, he follows the latest developments in pharmaceutical research, and keeps Joanne informed of all the latest news in the pharmaceutical and biotechnology world.

Joanne MacDonald

Joanne graduated from Oklahoma State University with a degree in Microbiology. After a few years working in a research laboratory conducting experiments under the supervision of the director of the lab, Joanne moved on to her "dream job" managing human clinical research studies of investigational drugs. These research studies are a crucial part of getting new drugs into the marketplace, or of getting an older drug approved for a new indication. Joanne retired from GlaxoSmithKline in 2005, struck out on her own and started JMacDonald Clinical Research Consulting, Inc. In this capacity, Joanne manages clinical research studies for many different pharmaceutical and biotech companies.



Rotary to an extraordinary degree in almost every event both offers and mandates each of its members to make some kind of connection beyond the usual routines of life. And we are better for it.



Christmas 1941 - An Editoral

THIS WEEK we celebrate the birthday of a young Galilean carpenter who, nearly two thousand years ago, started out on a brief career which was to change the entire course of human history.

He was a friendly sort of a man who loved to mix and mingle with all kinds of people. In fact, He was sometimes criticized for associating with publicans and sinners, but He kept right on carrying to them a message of hope and cheer. He enjoyed the social functions of that day and on one occasion was


known to have saved His hostess from a very embarrassing situation at her daughter's wedding reception.

His was a most sympathetic disposition. He rejoiced in the happiness of others and wept with them in their sorrow. He loved little children and asked that they be allowed to come to Him, "for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven."

He was a strong man. Strong in body and spirit. After forty days A fasting in the wilderness and while still suffering the pangs of hunger, He resisted the temptation to eat bread illegally obtained. One day He found a group of money changers defiling the Temple of Jerusalem and single handed drove them into the street with a homemade whip as his only weapon.

He was a great physician, for in the short space of three years He cured all forms of human suffering-both physical and spiritual-wherever He found it.

He was an ethical business man who it told the truth and paid His debts. His business advice was-and still is-to "renders unto Caesar the



things which are Caesar's." He was a wonderful organizer for He selected twelve simple men from the lowliest walks of life and molded them into an organization, which has literally dominated the world.

He spoke to His associates as one having authority. Instead of the usual preface used by the prophets, "thus sayest the Lord," He began his discourses, "Verily, I say unto you."

He lived true to the Rotary principle of "Service above self". In fact, He was the originator of that idea and

truly exemplified it by voluntarily submitting to an ignominious death on the cross that others might live throughout eternity. The Carpenter of Nazareth died but the Christ of Calvary arose. The Son of Man was slain but the Son of God still lives and reigns as the Prince of Peace.

During these dark days of world conflict and strife when the ideal of "Peace on Earth and Good Will to Men" seems relegated to the realm of an obsolete past, let us not forget to turn aside on Christmas day in reverent thanks to God for the greatest of all Christmas gifts - His only begotten Son.

To top off the evening, children visited Santa Land where children got to whisper in Santa Claus' ear their wishes for presents they hoped to receive. 

Jeff Cooper gave an inspirational invocation followed by **Dan Kirk** who introduced several guests and visiting Rotarians.

The program today was timely being December 7 and the seventy-fifth anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor. The program, introduced by President Reuben, was a presentation by four Marietta Rotary members who were in the "between generation" who witnessed the Pearl Harbor attack but were too young to fight.



Jim Trapnell was thirteen years old on Dec 7, 1941 and told what it was like to grow up in the war years in a small town in Southeast Georgia. Although only 13 year old Jim's life did change, his parents and family changed greatly with rationing for food and gasoline. He told of the unification of America where everyone had a common goal to help the war effort. All who spoke agreed that Americans sacrificed gladly for the war effort.



Bill Smith Sr., who was at home recovering from an illness, stated he lived in a small farming town in North Carolina. Also thirteen, Bill felt that his life was not impacted as much as his family's.

Buck Northcutt who grew up in Marietta saw a differ-

ent life. Marietta was a larger town and had the newly built Bell Bomber plant. The town grew extensively during the war years.



And finally Dr. **Jim Speed** who had just turned eleven was living in Birmingham,

Alabama. Birmingham was a steel producing town and therefore a potential bomb target. They were required to have black out curtains, shades on the automobile headlights and did not allow the street lights to be turned on.

The meeting was adjourned with the pledge to the flag and four way test by Daniel Kirk.
