Richard Woods
State School Superintendent


Richard Woods was born in Pensacola, Florida and while growing up in a military family, lived in California, Hawaii and Virginia before moving to Georgia. He graduated from Fitzgerald High School, and went on to receive a Bachelor's Degree from Kennesaw State University and a Master's Degree from Valdosta State University.

Woods has over 22 years of pre-k through12th grade experience in public education. Woods was a high school teacher for 14 years, serving as department chair and teacher mentor. During his tenure, he was also selected as Teacher of the Year. For eight years Woods served in various administrative roles such as assistant principal, principal, curriculum director, testing coordinator, pre-k director, and alternative school director.

Woods also brings a business background to the superintendent's position, having been a purchasing agent for a national/multi-national laser company and a former small business owner.

He and his wife Lisha, a retired 30-year educator, are long-time residents of Tifton and have been married for 24 years.

## Meet Jim Powell

A "New" Member of Marietta Rotary

Abbott Hall and Joe Atkins recently joined "new" member Jim Powell for lunch at Canvas. Quotation marks are used with the word new because Jim is really not a new member. He is a former longtime club member and actually served as club president during 1990-1991. We debated whether to publish this new member article about Jim, but we came to realize that many of our truly new members were not involved in the club when Jim was president. Given Jim's prodigious record of business, community, and Rotary accomplishments, we could all benefit from learning his story.

Jim is a native of Lake City, South Carolina. Lake City is located near Florence and is also the hometown on Ronald McNair, one of the astronauts who perished in the Challenger disaster. Jim graduated from Lake City High School and went on to complete his B.S. in mathematics at Presbyterian College where he was a Distinguished Military Graduate in the Army ROTC Program. Serving in the Adjutant General Corps of the Army, Jim spent time at Fort Benjamin Henry Harrison, Fort Hood, Fort Jackson, and at Terminal Command in Sattahip, Thailand during the Vietnam War. He also served as a defense counsel in special court martial proceedings at Fort Hood.

After completing his military service, Jim went to work for Trust Company Bank (today's SunTrust) in Atlanta where he had many assignments including branch manager at Greenbriar Mall and managing the Credit and Commercial Training Department. Along the way, Jim obtained his MBA in Finance from Georgia State University. He eventually moved up the ranks at Trust Company and became the president of the Trust Company Bank of Cobb County and moved to West Cobb. Before completing his service at Trust Company, Jim worked with the CEO to develop a sixteen-branch network in Cobb County.

Next, Jim joined Northside Bank & Trust in Roswell where he became president and CEO. Later he served as president, CEO and vice chairman of United Community Bank Metro, in Marietta. Then after clearly establishing himself as a key leader in the banking industry, Jim organized, funded, and operated the Highland Commercial Bank and later sold it prior to retiring from banking. One of his proudest accomplishments was the moving, restoration, and repurposing of the Old Lost Mountain Store. You probably now know it as a bank. The logistics and work to accomplish this are worthy of an entire article.

Jim's life has exemplified community service both inside and outside of Rotary. He has been active in the American Cancer Society, the American Red Cross (Chair-



man of Cobb-Douglas Chapter and Director of Atlanta Chapter), Leadership Georgia, Girls Club, Inc., Downtown Development Authority of Powder Spring, Powder Springs Business Association, Cobb County Transit Advisory Board, Cobb Chamber of Commerce (Director, Vice President of Government Affairs), Presbyterian Homes (Executive Committee), Tommy Nobis Center (Director and Chairman), Wellstar Health System (Director and Chair of numerous committees), and Kennesaw State University Foundation (Chairman and Member of Board of Trustees). Jim also recently completed fifteen years of service on the Board of Trustees of Presbyterian College in Clinton, South Carolina. His Rotary service is outstanding and includes Roswell Rotary, Rotary Club of West Cobb (Organizing Chair and President), and Rotary Club of Marietta (President). He is a Paul Harris Fellow as well as a Will Watt Fellow.

Jim enjoys book collecting, travel, and teaching banking to today's bankers. He is married to Laura (also a Paul Harris Fellow) and they have grown children: Rusty, Kelly, and Ginny, as well as several grandchildren. The Powells live in Hardage Farm and are members of Marietta First Presbyterian Church.

## Minutes from the November 9 Meeting

President **Reuben Green** opened our meeting with a hearty welcome to all in attendance.

He recognized **Jim Kellogg** who was presented the Verizon Leadership Award in appreciation for setting the standard for leadership in the YWCA of Northwest Georgia's efforts to achieve the goal of a community free of domestic violence and sexual assault.

**Dawn McEachern** asked everyone to sign on our club's website to review the information on file for each member. We will soon start on-line billing for dues.

We were also reminded that John Berry's 20th Annual Christmas Show kicks off in Marietta on November 18th at the Marietta Performing Arts Center. Tickets are on sale for \$30 for General Admission and \$35 for Premium Admission.

In honor of Veterans Day we had very special visitors – both veteran mentors and veteran participants - from the Cobb County Veterans Court who were introduced by **Clint Austin.** We also played the service song of each branch of service and asked each veteran to stand and be recognized during their service song. Clint also introduced our guests and visiting Rotarians. President Reuben then called **Marla** 

**Blackstone** and **Abbott Hall** to the front of the meeting room to help him present a medal and certificate to each club member who had served in the military.

Our very special speaker today was Master Sergeant Mike Reynolds.

Retired Master Sqt. Mike Reynolds began his career as an EMT fresh out of high school and soon after enlisted in the Army to become a medic. But in October of 2009 six months into his last deployment his vehicle was struck by enemy fire and he suffered a severe blow to the head. He tried to push through his injuries to continue doing the job he loved but struggled. He then returned to Georgia but continued to suffer from physical and emotional pain. He was re-evaluated at Fort Benning and properly diagnosed with a traumatic brain injury. Reynolds spent time in the hospital before being moved into the Wounded Warrior Battalion. During his recovery, the Chief of the Fort Benning Fire Department took him in and gave the Master Sqt. a place to be with people with whom he was familiar. He found a place to fit in again. After nearly 18 years of military service, Mike was medically retired in July 2011. He tried to get into the VA hospital but struggled to obtain appointments. Reynolds feels the VA is not a bad system but is grossly overwhelmed. During the time without medical

attention, Reynolds began to again have terrible headaches and noticed that his sleep, speech and vision had again become disturbed. His wife began asking for help and was informed of the Shepherd Center. The Shepherd Center is ranked among the nation's top rehabilitation hospitals for spinal cord and brain injuries. SHARE is a rehabilitation program that focuses on assessment and treatment for service members who have sustained a mild to moderate traumatic brain injury and post-traumatic stress disorder from the Afghanistan and Iraq conflicts. Mike has overcome many of his physical injuries, but continues to struggle with the loss of his memory and his inability to organize his thoughts. The former Medic explains how hard it is to go from a life of adrenaline and excitement, rushing to emergency scenes, to save lives, to a life in which he can no longer experience the same rush.

Mike is no longer able to impact the community in the same way that he used to but now gives a "leadership class", in which he talks about toxic work relationships and being aware of and concerned with the fact that the decisions you make affect others. He asks his audience to be more aware of the way they treat everyone from their employees to their spouses and children.

In Honor of Mike and the SHARE rehabilitation program our club collected \$647 from our members and a \$500 matching donation from the club's funds totaling to \$1147 given to the Shepard Center.

The meeting was concluded with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Air Force veteran **Glenn Owens** and the Four Way Test led by Marine Veteran **Dan Kirk**.

As a District 6900 Rotarian – or a family member – you can to help us welcome the world to Atlanta next June. Volunteers will be the Atlanta face to our visitors, helping introduce True Southern Hospitality to our guests and ensure convention visitors have a safe, welcome and enjoyable time in Atlanta.

The opportunity to volunteer is open to any Rotarian or Rotaractor or guest of a Rotarian or Rotaractor who is registered for the convention and at least 19 years old.

Volunteers will be positioned at sites around the Atlanta area to help our guests find their way to and from various locations in Atlanta. They will be positioned at the airport, the train station, all hotels, and all major HOC events.
