This Week's Speaker: Teela Spiller, Executive Director, Atlanta Micro Fund

Teela Spiller's career began in Real Estate in 1995. Since this time, she's evolved from leasing and property management to real estate negotiation and mortgage origination to economic development and community lending. Teela controls the Atlanta Micro Fund, a nonprofit revolving loan fund providing access to capital and technical assistance. She also controls teelaspillerinc., a community development and economic revitalization real estate firm. The focus of her efforts includes supporting Historical Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) as well as the communities surrounding them and the creation of commercial corridors in low-income communities.

Last Week's Speaker: Douglas B. Ammar, Georgia Justice Project

President Elma asked Neil Shorthouse to present our speaker. Neil thanked Doug Ammar, director of the Georgia Justice Project, a remarkable person leading a remarkable organization. Doug's been a part of GJP since its inception when it was founded in 1988 by former King & Spalding lawyer, John Pickins. GJP stands as a bridge of hope for many people coming out of prison who want to be financially and socially stable – and wanting to be useful and fulfilled members of society. For freed persons, this is difficult, so GJP challenges many barriers to gain true freedom, given the nature of the criminal justice system in Georgia. GJP (1) provides support on selected cases for persons who lack effective legal representation in the courts, sometimes gaining acquittals, (2) assists those inmates before and after their release in gaining stability and to reduce barriers to successful reentry, and (3) advocates for changes needed in the law through work with the Georgia legislature. Doug reported the USA is the world leader in the percent of the population incarcerated: While the United States represents about 4.4 percent of the world's population, it houses around 22 percent of the world's prisoners. In 2016, the Prison Policy Initiative estimated that in the United States about 2,298,300 people were incarcerated out of a population of 323.1 million. Incarceration rates (in 2010) by race in the U.S.: 380 whites per 100,000 are incarcerated; 966 Latinos per 100,000; 2207 blacks per 100,000 are incarcerated. Doug noted that while 600,000 persons leave the system each year, many return owing to the lack of a transition system and, significantly, a job that can enable them to have money to support a new and positive life. Fortunately, under Governor Nathan Deal criminal justice is reforming slightly. Michael Boggs, Georgia Supreme Court Justice and leader of Governor Deal's criminal justice reform program, says the costs of incarceration are way too high and positive results are lacking. One positive step: "banning the box" from employment applications. If one has a criminal record, employment is almost impossible. Doug explained that next to a good education as a tool of preventing crime and incarceration, blocking decent employment stands as the number one reason contributing to "perpetual punishment" - the "new Jim Crow" system that Doug says uses jail as a way to oppress indefinitely huge numbers of people. - Neil Shorthouse
