# My Rotary Bank Account

As I worked my way through a long list of e-mails last week, I came across one from a friend I had not heard from for some time. The subject line read "Magic Bank Account." Excited to hear from her, I quickly opened the e-mail to find a short story - found in the billfold of Coach Paul Bear Bryant of the University of Alabama after he died in 1983.

#### **The Magic Bank Account**

Imagine that you had won the following prize in a contest: Each morning your bank would deposit \$86,400 in your private account for your use.

- 1. The money that you didn't spend during each day would be taken away from you.
- 2. You may not simply transfer money into some other account.
- 3. You may only spend it.
- 4. Each morning upon awakening, the bank opens your account with another \$86,400 for that day.
- 5. The bank can end the game without warning; at any time it can say, "Game Over!" It can close the account and you will not receive a new one. What would you personally do? You would buy anything and everything you wanted, right? Not only for yourself, but for all the people you love and care for. Even for people you don't know, because you couldn't possibly spend it all on yourself, right?

You would try to spend every penny, and use it all, because you knew it would be replenished in the morning, right?

Actually, this game is real. Each of us is already a winner of this prize. We just can't seem to see it. The prize is TIME.

- 1. Each morning we awaken to receive 86,400 seconds as a gift of life.
- 2. And when we go to sleep at night, any remaining time is NOT credited to us.
- 3. What we haven't used up that day is forever lost.
- 4. Yesterday is forever gone.
- 5. Each morning the account is refilled, but the bank can dissolve your account at any time without warning. So, what will you do with your 86,400 seconds?

This made me think of the time we spend as Rotarians. I truly believe that Rotary is not just something we do, it is who we are. Our gift of time is spent making this world a

better place for our loved ones and often times for those we will never meet. As I continue my journey through our District, I am amazed by the number of seconds that we each give to improve the lives around us.




District 6900 is offering two competitive \$30,000 scholarships for graduate study starting the fall of 2015. The student's career goals must align with at least one of the Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment, Water and Sanitation. Maternal and Child Health, Basic Education and Literacy, and Economic and Community Development.

Scholars may NOT be a Rotarian; an employee of a club, district, or any other Rotary entity; or the spouse, a lineal descendant, or an ancestor of any person in the first two categories. Scholars MAY BE a member of a Rotaract Club. Scholars must have residence in District 6900 or must be employed full time in the District or be a fulltime student in a university in the District.

#### Atlanta Area Rotary Clubs Donate \$83,000 in Equipment to FODAC

The **Rotary Clubs of North Atlanta and Sandy Springs** each held collection drives in May to benefit the Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC) a non-profit organization that provides over \$10 million annually in durable medical equipment (DME) and supplies to the disabled community. More than \$83,000 in gently-used HME was collected from the community and delivered to FODAC for refurbishment and redistribution.

FODAC collects, repairs and redistributes over 5,000 HME items to the public each year at little or no cost to the recipient. Much of the HME FODAC supplies to the disabled community comes via donations, with a large amount coming from individual donors, who are looking to provide a "second life" to items like

wheelchairs, crutches and shower benches that are no longer being used.

Realizing FODAC's need for donated equipment as well as the public need for a solution as to where to recycle the equipment, two metro Atlanta Rotary clubs sponsored HME collection drives for the organization. The **North Atlanta Rotary Club** held its first DME collection project for FODAC in August of 2013, during which it collected equipment worth over \$27,000. Building on the success of the first collecting equipment valued at over \$77,000, a record for any organization's single collection drive in FODAC's 25-year history.

"A main part of Rotary membership is service to the community," said Jon Yaeger, President of the Rotary Club of North Atlanta. "We appreciate the efforts of the collection team, especially Broc Fisher, who rallied our members to promote the event through their local churches and other community contacts. We hope this program has raised awareness of FODAC and its mission, and will continue to drive donations throughout the year."

The **Rotary Club of Sandy Springs** also stepped in - offering to establish and manage a permanent HME collection site. The recycling program was launched during Earth Week , in partnership with "Keep North Fulton Beautiful," with a week-long collection event to promote the permanent location to the surrounding community residents and businesses. The club delivered its first trailer-load of equipment at the end of May, to FODAC's warehouse in Stone Mountain.

"We hope this is the first of many deliveries to FODAC," stated Fran Farias, community service director, Rotary Club of Sandy Springs. "Our plan is to keep the collection site at Morgan Falls to provide a place for Sandy Springs residents to recycle DME, but we also want to promote the trailer to other organizations as a mobile resource to host their own collection drives for FODAC."

Items collected in both drives included crutches, canes, walkers, braces, air casts, manual and power wheelchairs (including footrests), medical supplies, bathroom equipment, grab bars, children's adaptive equipment and other assistive technology – much of which might have ended up in landfills were it not for FODAC. A pioneer in re-use, FODAC keeps 200 tons of materials out of landfills each year by refurbishing and reissuing over 400 HME items every month, and is recognized nationally for best practices in recycling and reuse of DME.

Coach Dooley is a member of the Wilderness Team and a Rotarian. When the U. of Georgia didn't name its football field for him, the Hondurans decided they would honor him with their futbol field bearing his name. There is plenty of work to do ranging from working with youngsters in the schools, supporting medical needs in the clinics and mixing cement for projects in the villages. Accommodations at the ranch are comfortable, and the people of Honduras are delightful. You are guaranteed a great time, meaningful experience and a wonderful group of new friends...who will last a lifetime.



The cost of the trip if an all-inclusive \$750 for expenses once in Honduras and you book your own airfare to Tegucigalpa to land mid-day on March 14<sup>th</sup>. Delta flies direct from Atlanta and the recent ticket price is \$701.

The work has gone on in this area of Honduras for two decades and there is plenty of meaningful work to do. The size of the group was 50 last year and there is room for a good many more.

- Educator of the Year: Deputy Superintendent of Cobb Schools Cheryl Hungersford. After more than 30 years as an educator, Cheryl is retiring this year to spend more time with family and friends.
- Firefighter David Dwyer an amazing and multitalented member of the Cobb County Fire Department. Experienced in firefighting, EMT/ Paramedic, and technical services, David spends much of his time now teaching and instructing colleagues, and leading a CFD youth mentoring program.

- Law Enforcement: Detective Richard Goodman. To say that Richard Goodman is a "super cop" is an understatement. His tireless efforts across several major investigations this past year interrupted major gang activity not only in the Cobb community, but across the metropolitan Atlanta area. Detective Goodman has a knack for seeing the connections in apparently unrelated investigations and, using that skill, was able to weave a very wide net to catch lots of bad guys.
- Military: Cpl. John Paul (J.P) Alvarez, an East Cobb native and graduate of Walton High School. In 2005, John enlisted in the Marines. After finishing at the top of his machine gunner class, he joined the 3rd Battalion 8th Marines and was deployed in March of 2006 to Iraq. While there, he received an injury in combat. He was awarded two purple hearts and the Navy Commendation Medal, with Valor. We honored Cpl Alvarez not only for his soldering on the field of battle, but for the way he has bravely soldiered on with his life after leaving the service in 2008. It has been a long road, physically and mentally, but Cpl Alvarez is now in his fourth year at Kennesaw State pursuing a degree in Criminal Justice. He has a wonderful family, including a five-year-old son. Cpl Alvarez's positive attitude and determination is an inspiration to us all, and it was our honor to present a Service Above Self Award.
