EVOLUTION OF AMERICAN TANNING & LEATHER CO.

Christy Plott of American Tanning and Leather Company (MTLC) spoke of her family's 95-year-old business that has evolved from tanning furs and skins from trappers to the preparation and sale of high-quality alligator skins. Christy's great-grandfather started the business in 1923 working with furs and associated skins. After WWII, they expanded into raw alliqator skins which is now the primary component of their work production. Today, AMLC purchases alligators directly from trappers. Each gator must be federally inspected and tagged. Sizes of the animals and grades of the skins vary. She explained that tanning an alligator skin is a 10-step process initially involving descaling, treating with mineral chrome to give the hide the blue-green color, stretching, shaving to desired thickness, and re-tanning to add oils to the skin. At this stage, the skin can be stored indefinitely. Eventually, the skin is selected, dyed, toggled (tacking to a board) when a variety of finishes can be added, and graded for quality control. Sustaining their business relies on the conservation and management of the alligator. The hunting of alligators is regulated by the Convention on the International Trade of Endangered Species that insures threatened species are not overhunted to extinction. Alligator famers also contract with landowners for the right to collect alligator eggs from their undeveloped lands. These eggs are hatched and the gators are raised to 3-feet in length when 10% are released on the contracted land to sustain their populations.
