While producing a documentary film in Uganda, I saw people who had survived the disease of polio. Often they are rejected in their communities. I'm a polio survivor myself. Back in the United States, I realized that many people have a lightly-used and no-longer-needed mobility device from a twisted ankle, ski accident, or operation. I saw crutches at garage sales, in dumpsters, and unfortunately in roll-off containers headed to landfills. I knew that I had to do something: this was the genesis of Crutches 4 Africa.

WHEN WE LAST MET

Minutes from the January 16 Meeting

The January 16th, 2019, Rotary luncheon was called to order by President Jesse Evans, and the food blessed by Jennifer Nelson. Several members brought family members as guests to this meeting, and the guests were introduced to the club by Sandeep Kapoor. President Jesse then transitioned to member announcements, beginning with recognition of the Rotaract Club of Kennesaw State University. ADG Mark Barbour delivered Rotary regalia, including Rotary ties, to KSU Rotaract students who were graduating, on behalf of our Club. In response, the Rotaract Club wrote a very gracious thank you note to us, which President Jesse read to our Club. Richard Cope provided an update on the Crutches 4 Africa program, alerting the club that Friday, February 1st will be shipment day, and that only the strong of back and will need attempt to help with the heavy lifting.

President Jesse then Sunshined us all with the "Rotarians in the News" portion of the program. One of our own, **Dan "Mencken" Kirk** penned not one, not two, but THREE letters to the Marietta Daily Journal, with the target of his quill being Publix. Not to be outdone by the grocery store skeptic of our time, President Jesse announced that **Neera Bahl** was accepted into the Honorary Commanders program. Also on the move among Marietta Rotarians was **Bert Reeves**, announced by Governor Kemp as one of his Floor Leaders in the House of Representatives for the 2019 Legislative Session. Finally, President Jesse recognized Past-President **Adele Grubbs** and the MDJ coverage of her portrait unveiling. Also recognized for mention in that coverage was Past-President **Reuben Green**, but appropriately Reuben was merely second fiddle to Judge Grubbs.

Speaking of Past-President Reuben playing second fiddle, he was kind enough to introduce the day's speaker, his wife Heidi Green. While Heidi is no doubt a leader in her field as the Managing Director in Deloitte's Policy & Government Relations team, her story and career left the club members in awe of what she has accomplished at such a young age. From her beginnings in Washington, D.C. working with Congressman Bill Thomas, to her time as a Senior Aide to former Governor Sonny Perdue, and then to her four years in the Georgia Department of Economic Development as Deputy Commissioner and then Commissioner of Global Affairs, Heidi has spent her career serving and representing our State in an honorable and efficient manner. While she has served in many interesting and impressive capacities, Heidi treated the club to a number of stories and her unique insight obtained from recently serving as the Chief of Staff to Secretary Perdue at the United States Department of Agriculture.

Heidi recalled missing a pretty important phone call, from Secretary Perdue after he had been nominated for the Cabinet position. Upon finally returning that call, she recalled Perdue telling her about the nomination and his simple question: "are you coming with me?" Heidi took that opportunity of a

lifetime and joined Secretary Perdue with the USDA from his confirmation until leaving for Deloitte in 2018. While she toiled in D.C. helping run a federal department with a \$140 Billion (yes, with a B) budget, Past-President Reuben finally picked up the slack at home, toting the kids to events, doing laundry, and other tasks he previously thought himself incapable of tackling. But thanks to Heidi's sacrifice and dedication to our country, Reuben grew up a little as well.

Heidi expanded upon her USDA experience, enlightening club members about all of the responsibilities, duties, and accomplishments related to the USDA that are completed daily, yet go seemingly unrecognized by everyday citizens. The USDA finances half of the United States power grid. It sets dietary guidelines, supports farmers, ensures that our food is safe, and promotes trade of U.S. products around the world. The USDA, under the leadership of Secretary Perdue and Heidi, also dedicated time and resources to improving rural prosperity, including aiding with such issues as clean water, electricity, and broadband access. Other issues of note that Heidi oversaw while with the USDA were improving the operational systems at the USDA, working on bills to aid with the SNAP program and funding crop insurance, and fixing a problem with funding for cleaning and maintenance of government owned property to prevent wildfires most often suffered in the western part of our country.

Heidi close her remarks with a story about the 2018 College Football National Champion Alabama football team's visit to the White House. While most Cabinet members are invited to attend, Heidi expected Secretary Perdue to decline given the heartbreaking nature of his beloved Dawgs falling to the evil empire run by Nick Saban. Secretary Perdue, however, decided to attend. At the day-of meeting with Vice President Pence, Secretary Perdue arrived, but with a UGA tie around his neck, surely a move to show Saban that the Dawgs will not be intimidated any longer. Additionally on that day, Saban requested to make recruiting calls from the White House; fortunately, that request was determined to be an ethical no-no and denied.... by Georgian and White House Chief Ethics Office Stefan Passantino.
